

SUFAC Makes 25.4% Budget Deduction for All Student Orgs for 2018-19 Academic Year

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Amount Requested Budget of \$142,000. Since the total amount of money requested from all student organizations was over the Total Amount Requested Cap of \$142,000. A 25.4% deduction had to be made to fairly compromise with all student orgs and their requested amounts.

There are many people across campus wondering what the long term effects of this 25.4% deduction to all student organizations will have once the 2018-19 academic year begins here at UW-Superior. It is still early for any one person to say, as there remains four weeks of the current semester. For

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On April 11th seniors who plan to walk at commencement made their way to the Yellowjacket Union at UWS to attend the annual Graduation Fair. Here students picked up their commencement tickets, honor cords, verified graduation honors with the Registrar's Office, and consulted with the Financial Aid Office about loan exit counseling. Each graduating student has 4 tickets set aside for them to pick up and the Graduation Fair was the first date to pick up tickets.

If a graduating senior was unable to pick up tickets at the fair they can do so in the Registrar's Office at Old Main in room 139. Students must pick up their tickets by Monday, April 30th or their tickets will be put into a general pool for students requiring additional tickets. Cap, tassel, hood, and gown are required to be worn by all graduates participating in commencement and can be purchased at the bookstore on campus. Spring commencement is scheduled for Saturday, May 19th at 2:00 p.m. at Wessman Arena.

Sexual Assault and Awareness Month opens with Community Event at Douglas County Court House

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"Embrace your voice. Do not just embrace your own voice but embrace the voices of those around you and encourage others to speak up." This is the theme community members learned of when Mayor Jim Paine proclaimed on April 3rd, that April is Sexual Assault and Awareness month.

Survivors, advocates, allies, and community members all gathered in the Superior Douglas County Court House to engage in a discussion and take a stand on sexual assault. The event was held in order to contest and show support to one of the most under reported crimes in society.

The month of April is now meant to help survivors, victims and allies of this crime to find a voice, embrace it, and share their story.

"The best part of the event was hearing the two speakers who had been individually impacted by sexual assault to be courageous enough to share their story," said University of Wisconsin-Superior student, Jordan Wetterlind.

This Day of Action Proclamation was also the kickoff event for University of Wisconsin-Superior's Professor Maria Cuzzo's Law and Human Behavior Class's Academic Service Learning (ASL) project. The students of this course were to make a professional poster, displaying information of an assigned organization that provides services to victims, survivors, and the community impacted by sexual assault. The posters together, were labeled a "Gallery of Help" to be displayed together to demonstrate all the organizations out there helping those affected by sexual assault and how each organiza-

tion helps in different ways. The student's posters were displayed along the outsides of the room at the proclamation. The "Gallery of Help" will also be displayed at other events throughout the month of April as part of the ASL project.

Many students from Cuzzo's class sparked a lot of interest in this project and have found it to be very impactful. "The most important thing I've taken from this ASL project is that it isn't just the victim's problem. It's a societal thing, by not teaching our sons what consent is, and teaching that violence is an option we uphold the structure. We as a society need to tackle this project and stand with our friends and family members that have gone through this. To give them their power back and show them that they're not alone and to show the world it is not okay," said a student of Cuzzo's course, Jordan Wetterlind.

Many victims of sexual assault find it hard to speak up and say something, so they often find it better to stay quiet and say nothing at all. But in reality, in a situation like this, it is best to speak up. Hopefully the month of April and this proclamation will not only inspire victims of sexual assault but also their allies to embrace their voice and speak out about this issue.

"I really hope that the proclamation was a catalyst for conversation about it. We have cultural sanctions that quiet the victim and tell us it isn't okay to talk about rape and such, but by talking about it we can raise awareness," said Wetterlind.
