UWS Hosts Opening Weekend Tourneys

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Stinger Classic:

Over the weekend Superior brought in athletes from all over Wisconsin and Minnesota with the volleyball Stinger Classic and the Twin Ports Collegiate Golf Opener.

Starting with the Stinger Classic which brought six volleyball teams to Mertz Mortorelli Gymnasium for the two day tournament on Sept. 8 and 9. UW-Superior hosted five other Minnesota and Wisconsin universities.

For the Yellowjackets volleyball team, they began the tournament with two wins over conference foe Northland College 3-1 and a sweep over SMU.

On Saturday, the Yellowjackets started the day by facing the only other unbeaten team, Concordia.

UWS won the first set 22-25 then lost the second 19-25, after that they never looked back, racking up back-to-back 25-19 sets to win 3-1.

In the final game for UWS they faced CSS in a border battle match. UWS was able to pick up the first two sets before Scholastica grabbed the third forcing a fourth set.

In the final set UWS made sure to leave nothing up to chance, defeating CSS in the fourth set by their largest margin of victory of the weekend 25-15.

UWS finished the tournament 4-0 and with BLC being the only team they didn't face picking up losses to Concordia and SMU, the Yellowjackets were the only unbeaten team.

Two Yellowjackets were also named to the Stinger Classic's All-Tournament team, junior Jenna Anderson as a defensive specialist/libero and senior Kaylin Plautz as middle hitter/right side.

Twin Ports Collegiate: Also in Superior over the weekend UW-Superior hosted the Twin Ports Collegiate golf meet.

The meet brought Crown College, the College of St. Scholastica, Martin Luther College, and Northland College to Nemadji Golf Course.

The men's teams finished in first and second with UWS A shooting 17 strokes over par and UWS B 29 strokes behind at +46.

The next closest to both UWS teams was CSS's-

A team who finished 54 strokes above par.

The men were led by Conner Willard who finished first place, shooting a 71. Willard was followed by eight Yellowjackets in the top eleven.

On the women's side of things they finished in third place after shooting a team score of 364 in day one and 382 in the final day.

St. Scholastica won the tournament shooting a team total 78 over par followed by Crown College in second place.

Scholastica's A team sealed the win while securing all five golfers in the top seven.

Olivia Weyenberg and Ashton Parnell were the only Yellowjackets to finish in the top ten with Weyenburg shooting 36 over par for ninth place.

Parnell tied for tenth with Maddy Bloedel of Northland shooting one stroke worse than teammate Weyenburg.

UWS finished with three more golfers in the top twenty.

With an expected finish date of this fall, many are wondering why the New Superior Choice Credit Union Stadium hasn't begun filling the Ole Haugsgard field quite yet.

During the summer crews began taking the bleachers off the field, but other than that there hasn't been much work done.

There's many reasons for the delay, according to Athletic Director Nick Bursik those

included; difficulties getting materials, last year's record snowfall, financial requirements through the state, while also doing what they can to keep the stadium viable for the next 30 years.

Bursik believes in some ways the delay has helped shape a new evolution for the stadium.

"Our priority has always been trying to ensure we are putting the best surfaces down for our student athletes and for our students and their academic courses," Bursik said before stating what's being done during the delay. "The delay in construction has allowed us to insure that we're going to be able to put the right surfaces down not only from a performance

standpoint but also health and safety."

The project is not only for the Yellow jackets, as youth events, tournaments and more will be held at the stadium after its completion.

Bursik went on to note the relationship with SCCU and the communication with them through the process The stadium is anticipated to be finished by next fall semester with a groundbreaking in the Spring.
