SUPERIOR LOSES FIRST CONFERENCE GAME

Last Saturday our football team was defeated by Eau Claire in the first conference game for both teams. The game was played in a sandy, slow field with the temperature in the neighborhood of 80 degrees. There was not a bit of breeze and the air was stuffy. The weather was far from being ideal for football, and was the direct cause of many pauses in the game for rest and recuperation.

Eau Claire got the jump on Superior when early in the first quarter an Eau Claire player recovered a fumbled punt on the twenty yard line, and crossed the goal for a touchdown. Again, in the second quarter, with brilliant passes paving the way, a second touchdown was made. Also in this quarter, the Eau Claire quarterback placed a perfect drop kick between the goal posts, and thereby added three more points. Thus the score was 17 to 0 at the end of the first half. With defeat almost a certainty our team played a splendid game in the last half. Eau Claire was unable to score in the third quarter. In the final quarter, Superior started on a rampage which was more than gratifying to both Coach Tabbs and Superior fans. Two perfect forward passes advanced the ball to Eau Claire’s twenty-yard line. Here Tommy O’Neil went around right end and was tackled inside the five-yard line. In two more plays the ball was carried over the goal for a touchdown. Milton Weeks missed the kick for goal. A little later Superior started down the field with the same determination but the game was over before a touchdown could be made. Captain Bud Hagener, “Fug” Connelly and Folkey Johnson all played a great defensive game. Tommy O’Neil, though out of the game much of the time, played the best game of the back-field men.

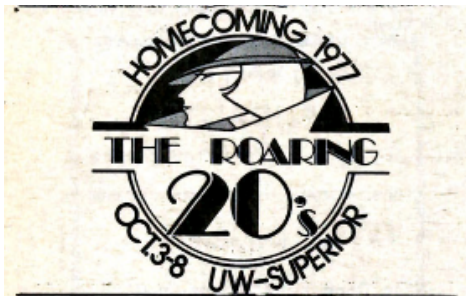
Homecoming Game With Falls November 18th

Committee Plans Hugest Celebration Ever Held At Superior

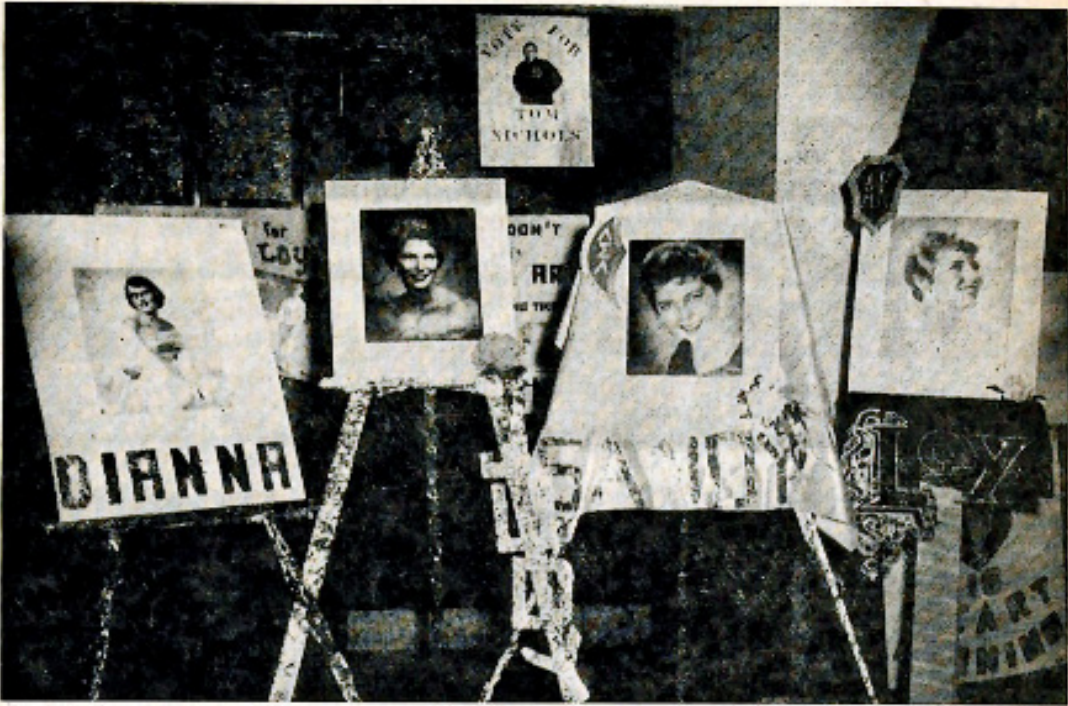
